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Markham Racing Forward



The race is on. With the adoption of Budget 2026, Markham will move forward with an investment of \$160.4 million dedicated to well over 200 capital projects. Of this, \$89 million is earmarked for repairing and refurbishing existing roads, recreation centres, libraries, cultural facilities, and other community amenities. The remaining \$71 million will fund projects to support growth, including road network and new watermain construction, and the development of community spaces such as parks and trails.

Markham works efficiently to get critical projects across the finish line. Since 2022, we have invested \$680 million across 1,036 capital projects, most of them significant initiatives ranging from road resurfacing to flood mitigation to construction of major parks and trails. To date, close to 70% of these dollars have been spent, reflecting our dedication to staying on track and getting things done.

This year's budget proves once again that fiscal responsibility, quality service, and forward-thinking community investment are constant touchstones of our commitment to bettering our city.

Over more than two decades, we have the lowest average property tax rate increase in the GTA. This would only be possible through careful stewardship of taxpayer dollars and our focus on responsible spending.

I am pleased to present Budget 2026. The property tax increase is 3.90%. For the average home in Markham, this represents an additional \$54.99 on the city portion of the tax bill.

In Markham's most recent Citizen Satisfaction Survey, 80% of residents agreed that the City delivers quality services to its residents. A significant part of our journey involves building and renewing the infrastructure that supports daily life and future growth.

This year's total budget of \$677.9 million includes addressing critical infrastructure such as the Flood Control Protection Program for Markham Village and continuing with our Asphalt Resurfacing Program across the City. We are moving forward with the design of the Highway 404 ramp extension at Major Mackenzie. The City is refurbishing playgrounds, making them fully accessible by 2026 and is replacing the artificial turf at St. Roberts High School.

We are aiming high and overachieving.

We consistently demonstrate prudent financial management by allocating funds for future needs. Of Markham's \$17.5 billion in corporate assets, close to 90% are in good condition and we are increasing the Life Cycle investment by \$1.7 million to support repair and replacement of assets over the next 25 years.

Markham is geared up and ready to embrace the spotlight as we welcome one of the most prestigious events on the sporting calendar. The Ontario Honda Dealers Indy at Markham races into our City next year, driving over \$50 million into the economy. Next summer's exciting line up also includes the FIRA World Cup robotics competition, underscoring our reputation as Canada's High Tech Capital.

We continue to add to our roll call of recognition. Markham was awarded Municipality of the Year by Festivals and Events Ontario, celebrating excellence in tourism and community festivals in addition to awards for Canada Day, Markham-Milliken Children's Festival, AppleFest, along with the 2024 Little Native Hockey League 50th Anniversary Tournament, which also received the Event Legacy of the Year Award from Sport Tourism Canada.

We are celebrating 35 years of the Markham Civic Centre and 40 years of the Flato Markham Theatre—two iconic facilities side by side that stand as cornerstones of our civic, cultural, and community life.

From responsible budgets to vital projects and investing strategically in our shared future, Markham is in the driver's seat. Together with Council, staff, and our community partners, we are racing toward the horizon, knowing we are on the right track to ensuring our City's vibrancy and quality of life for everyone who calls Markham home

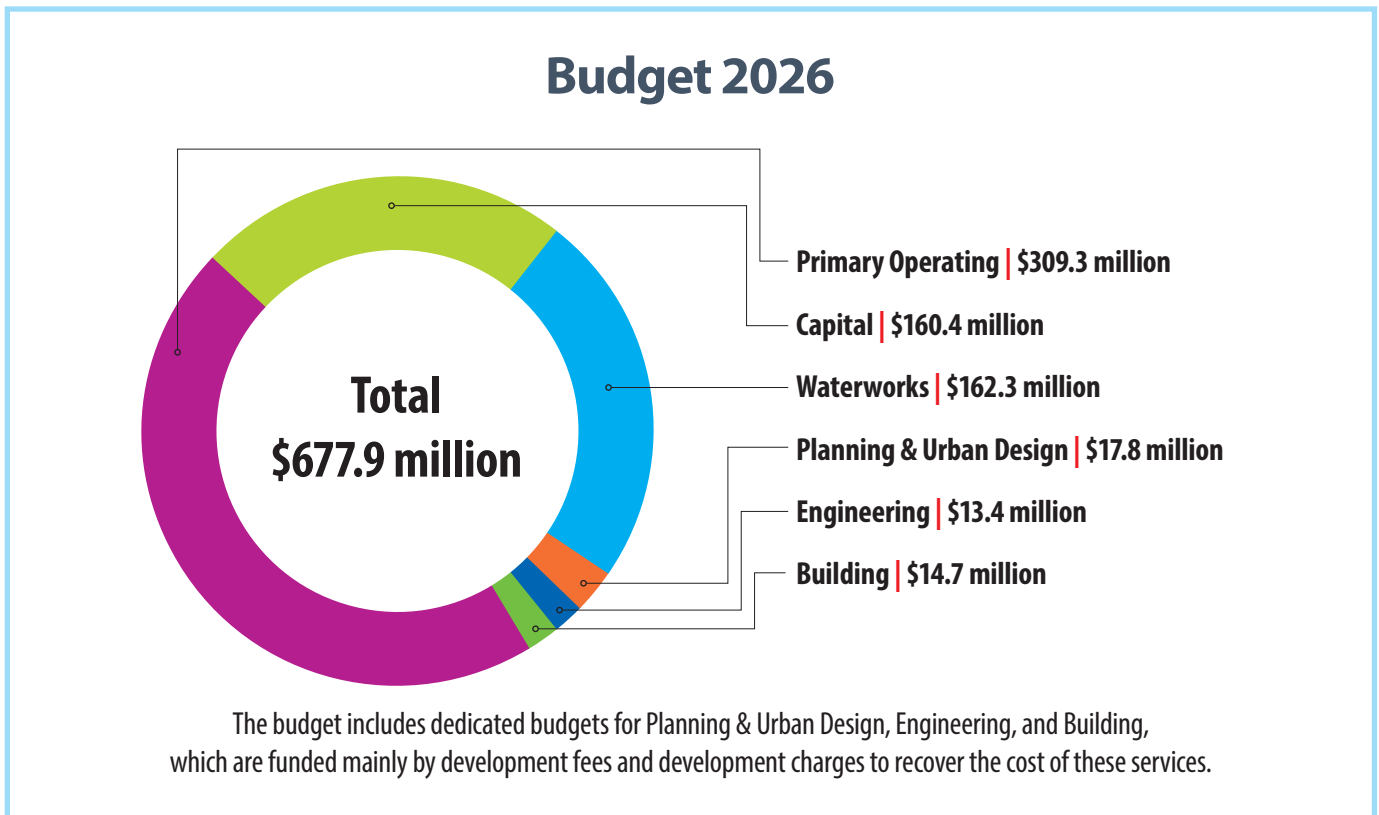

Responsible Markham

The City of Markham's budget for 2026 is \$677.9 million.



Delivering excellent services

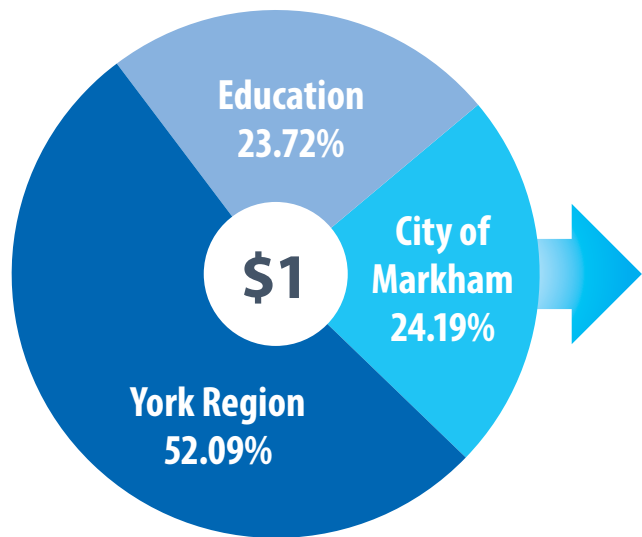
This year's budget highlights a long-standing tradition of exceptional people providing exceptional services. Budget 2026 allocates \$309.3 million from property taxes to support the City's everyday operations and service delivery.

In 2026, the property tax rate will increase by 3.90%, which translates to an additional \$54.99 on the City portion of the bill for the average Markham home. Markham is poised to maintain the lowest average tax rate increase in the GTA over the past 21 years. Budget 2026 reflects a strong record of fiscal responsibility, aiming to keep tax increases as low as possible while maintaining high-quality services for residents and businesses.

In Markham's most recent Citizen Satisfaction Survey (2024), 80% of residents agreed that the City delivers quality services to its residents.

In 2024, Markham staff reviewed and approved \$2.19 billion in construction value.

The budget funds operating costs to sustain the programs and services residents and businesses rely on, including recreation, libraries, garbage collection, fire services, parks and trails, and winter maintenance. It also accounts for operational cost pressures such as population growth, inflation, contract escalations, and staffing needs to ensure continued delivery of excellent services.

Investing in infrastructure

Budget 2026 includes \$160.4 million in capital funding to build and deliver 233 projects that maintain our infrastructure and support new growth.

About 44% or \$71.1 million of the capital budget is for projects to help support growth, including new storm sewer and watermain construction, road network construction, parks, green spaces, and pedestrian crossings and traffic signals.

Budget 2026 allocates approximately 56% or \$89.3 million to maintaining existing infrastructure in a good state of repair. This includes projects to repair and refurbish existing roads, recreation, library and cultural facilities and amenities. In addition, 0.9% or \$1.7 million is put aside as a proactive measure to repair and replace assets over the next 25 years.

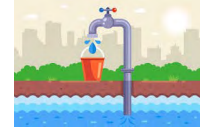

Key Capital Projects

The 2026 capital budget of \$160.4 million includes:

Since 2022, Markham has invested **\$680 million across 1,036 capital projects**, with an average of **675 active projects underway each year**. These range from road resurfacing and flood mitigation to new parks, refurbished playgrounds, and the construction of major community facilities. The majority of Markham's capital projects are classified as major initiatives, spanning multiple years and requiring extensive planning. Of the current active major projects, 67% of the budget is already spent, reflecting steady progress. Markham also has a strong track record of delivery, with 85% of annual or minor projects completed on time and within closure deadlines.

Key projects from 2022–2025 include the Highway 404 Midblock Crossing north of 16th Avenue, the West Thornhill and Markham Village Flood Control programs, the restoration of Main Street Unionville, and the creation of new parks, play features, and off-leash dog areas across the city.

Equally important is the need to maintain existing assets. The 2025 Corporate Asset Management Plan highlights that Markham’s Life Cycle Reserve requires additional funding to sustain current service levels. To address this, the City is ramping up to a 1% dedicated infrastructure investment, which will need to be increased further as infrastructure continues to age. This will ensure our assets remain in a state of good repair and continue to serve residents reliably into the future.

The recent Corporate Asset Management update shows that the City will need extra funding to maintain current service levels. Each year, the City will review its infrastructure investments through the Life Cycle Reserve Study, and the amount of funding may need to increase in the future.

Water rate increase

Budget 2026 also includes \$162.3 million for waterworks. For 2026, a 4.98% water rate increase is included to support water and wastewater services, representing an increase of \$52.99 for the average home in Markham. Water rate increases are subject to a variety of unavoidable factors including the cost of purchasing water.

Excellence through Efficiency and Effectiveness

Markham continually looks for ways to streamline and find efficiencies in service delivery. From 2009 to 2026, our Excellence through Efficiency and Effectiveness (E3) Program will have delivered \$37.2 million in annual operating savings, equal to a tax rate increase avoidance of 29.0%.



Did you know?

Phase 1 of the City’s Flood Control Protection program for Markham Village is scheduled to be completed by 2027. Through the 2026 budget process, the City is allocating an additional \$4.5 million for future phases of the program.

Building Markham

Did you know?

The City's target for road pavement condition is 70%. Right now, we are at 72.6% and working toward a goal of 75%. These ratings come from the Pavement Condition Index (PCI), which measures things like road structure, drainage, and surface condition following Ministry of Transportation guidelines.

Markham recently hosted an Ontario Vehicle Innovation Network (OVIN) Demonstration Zone, highlighting eight cutting-edge mobility projects, from e-scooters and EV charging to autonomous delivery and smart city mapping.

We are making strategic investments to expand and modernize the infrastructure that supports daily life, from roads and water systems to parks, trails, and community spaces. These projects not only help us manage growth responsibly but also ensure that Markham remains a safe, connected, and vibrant place for families, businesses, and future generations.

New infrastructure to manage growth

Investments include:

- Highway 404 North Ramp Extension and Collector Roads for the MiX (our emerging innovation district) - Design
- \$3.1M – 2026 Playground Replacements & Court Rebuild/Resurface – Construction
- \$2.4M – Victoria Square Boulevard Phase 2 - Design

New parks, trails and greenspaces are critical for City building. New investments include:

- \$12.3M – Rouge Valley Trail Phase 4B south of 14th Ave. Trail Construction
- \$2.9M for new parks (York Downs Main Park and Unionville Home Society Parkette)

In 2024, the City of Markham set a record with 4,216 building permits issued for housing units, significantly exceeding the provincial target of 3,667. Unfortunately the current methodology recognized only 1,825 housing starts for 2024, preventing us from accessing millions of dollars through the Province's Building Faster Fund. Markham has proven that we can process housing applications and building permits quickly. Markham has taken bold steps to streamline the approvals process, including completing a Lean Review and working closely with the development industry to find efficiencies in the planning process.

Resilient Markham


Building resilience today means safeguarding Markham's future. As climate change brings more frequent and severe weather events, Markham is investing in critical infrastructure to protect our community, strengthen essential services, and move closer to our net-zero emissions target by 2050. In 2026, 56% or \$89.3 million of the 2026 capital budget is dedicated to keeping our assets in a state of good repair, preparing for climate impacts, and ensuring residents continue to enjoy safe, reliable, and sustainable services for generations to come. 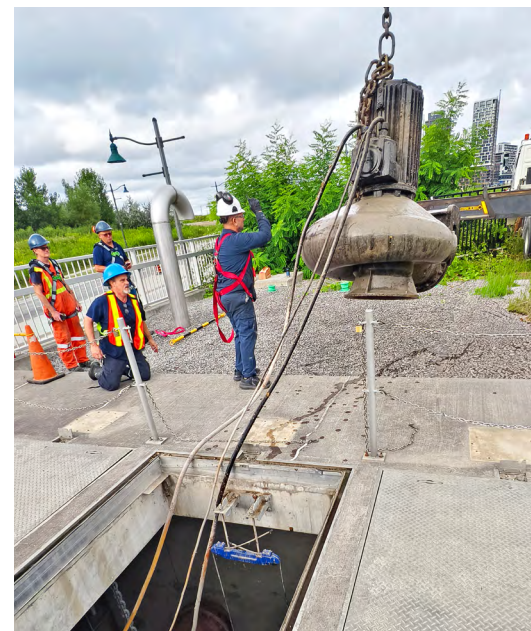

Accessible Markham

The City of Markham is committed to creating a welcoming and inclusive community for everyone. We are working to make our services, programs, and facilities easier to access while following the goals of our Diversity Action Plan, Eliminating Anti-Black Racism Action Plan, and Multi-Year Accessibility Plan. Budget 2026 investments include:

- Ⓜ \$2.5M for Active Transportation Master Plan construction and programs (Active School Travel Program, Smart Commute and Markham Cycles)
- Ⓜ \$2.3M for Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA) playground refurbishments year 4 of 4
- Ⓜ \$0.4M for IT upgrades to modernize and improve customer service (Building Permit Pre-Application AI Forms Reader and Contract Administration Software)
- Ⓜ \$0.3M for Culture Public Art Master Plan Implementation

Supporting Arts, Culture & Sport

2026 is taking shape to be a banner year for the City of Markham, including the celebration of numerous significant milestones. As the Flato Markham Theatre celebrates its 40th Anniversary, it will present a milestone season that places Canadian talent at the forefront—with over 70% of its programming featuring Canadian artists. There will be a gala to support Theatre's 40th Anniversary. Markham's status as Canada's High Tech Capital will be taken to a whole other level in 2026 with the hosting of the Federation of International Robot Sports Association (FIRA) World Cup at the Markham Pan Am Centre. Robotics teams from around the world will descend on Markham for thrilling competitions using cutting-edge technology.

Main Street Unionville is one of Markham's most cherished and celebrated attractions. Its historic buildings and unique landscape offer a serene escape, providing a backdrop for enjoying the city's history, unique retail stores, and world-class cuisine. To ensure its continued success, the City undertook a \$13.8 million restoration project of the street in August 2024 with completion set for the end of 2025. The project includes improved streetscaping and enhancements to public space, as well as the relining of

watermains and storm sewers to protect against failures and flooding. We are excited to launch the next chapter of Main Street Unionville's story in 2026!

Markham will enter the fast lane in the summer of 2026, hosting the largest sports and cultural celebration in York Region's history. The Ontario Honda Dealers Indy will now call Markham its home with the first race taking place the weekend of August 16, 2026. The track will be located in the eastern precinct of Markham's downtown. The event is expected to attract 150,000 attendees and generate over \$50 million in economic activity.

The 2026 budget includes \$1.1 million to replace the artificial turf at St. Roberts Soccer Dome, keeping the field game-ready so our athletes can train, compete, and achieve their best performances.

To support the growth and development of sport in our city, this year, we're making field upgrades to baseball diamonds in Cornell with more upgrades set for Milliken in 2026. This year's budget also supports a \$300,000 investment in the Public Art Master Plan implementation.

Did You Know?

Markham's community centres welcome almost 10 million visitors each year.
