4. Bill 140 – The Strong Communities Through Affordable Housing Act

- At Development Services Committee on June 12, 2017 and Budget Committee #2 (October 10) staff reported on preliminary costing for The Strong Communities Through Affordable Housing Act (Bill 140) based on 250 new inspections per year with 50% or 125 proceeding with compliance:
 - **\$0.50M net budget impact equivalent to a 0.34% tax rate increase**
- Since staff are continuing to review the details of the program as part of the due diligence process, it is recommended that no funds be included in the 2018 Budget
- Staff will report back in Q1 2018 with final recommendations including staffing implications, fees and Official Plan/Zoning By-law amendments

<p>18083 Angus Glen Community Centre Combined Heat & Power (CHP) System - \$2,164,100</p>	<p>Staff provided a presentation on the business case to support the purchase a combined heat & power system for the Angus Glen Community Centre.</p> <p>The Angus Glen Community Centre was chosen for this project as it is the City’s top energy user. If the project is a success, staff will look at installing the same type of a system at the Thornhill Community Centre which is the second largest energy user.</p> <p>The business case shows that if the City stays with the status quo it will spend \$39 million over a 30 year period as compared to \$33.8 million with the proposed system which will result in net savings of \$5.24 million dollars over a 30 year period. . The system will also extend the life of the existing boilers which will not be removed from the facility, but will continue to be used to support the new system, but with reduced operating time.</p> <p>The funds to purchase the system will be borrowed internally and will be paid back from the projected annual net savings of \$0.27 million and a one-time utility incentive of \$0.65 million. Payback from this investment is approximately six years. Interest will be charged on the loan to cover lost investment revenue.</p> <p>The building cannot be hooked up to Markham District Energy as it is outside of its service area. However, Markham District Energy may be the service provider of the new system.</p> <p>The new system will only be able to provide electricity, heat and cooling to the Angus Glen Community Centre as it is a large facility. A larger system was looked at, but had a less favourable payback period and it would not</p>

	<p>have been large enough to provide power to other buildings in the area.</p> <p>As stated earlier, the Province’s Save on Energy Program will provide a utility incentive of \$0.65 million towards the project. Staff anticipated that there will continue to be energy saving grants available in the future if the City decides to install the same or a similar type of system at other community centres in the future.</p> <p>Geothermal energy was considered as an alternative for the Angus Glen Community Centre, but the payback period was longer. A report will be brought forward to the General Committee on the success of the geothermal energy systems which were installed at the Markham Museum and the Cornell Fire Station.</p> <p>The Committee suggested having an open conversation with Alectra with respect to how the City can help provide power to Markham’s Future Urban Area.</p>

RESPONSES TO QUESTIONS FROM BUDGET COMMITTEE MEETINGS

Committee requested staff to provide details on the following items:

1. The Committee asked for a list of parks by year that have been in-service since 2014 through the Expedited Park Development Program.

Urban Design Staff prepared a list of parks constructed and in-service between 2014 and 2017. The list below totals 41 parks (93.27 acres). Two additional parkettes have been included which brings the total from 39 (as presented at the October 10 meeting) to 41.
